<b>Course: Institutions and the food system</b> (Lecture, Excursion, Seminar) <i>Contents:</i> Institutions structure economic exchange and collective action in the food system, for example in the organization of agricultural production, in regulating agriculture and environmental issues and in collective approaches to environmental management and public goods provision at scales, ranging from the farm level to global supply chains. At the same time institutions are expressed in policies. The course first specifies what institutions are and what roles institutions play in food and agricultural systems and in policy making. Approaches will cover the study of institutions from the perspective of New Institutional Economics. Public choice approaches will be presented to explain state-driven institutional change. The role of institutions for performance and change of the food and agricultural sectors will be illustrated through ample recourse to examples drawn from studies of the food and agricultural production systems in and outside of Europe. The module ends with introducing approaches to evaluate policies (being one type of institution) in the food and agricultural sectors.  Literature and seminar papers will be circulated to students at the beginning of term	4 WLH
